She didn't provide the particulars of the conversation, so I am not sure exactly how the gentleman offended her. I want to be careful not to make the same mistake.

I met a missionary couple from the U.S. who work with Navigators. They organize outings for international students. I accompanied them on a day trip to Glamis Castle in October and met many international students. I was able to have a good conversation with one young woman from Italy. I am hoping to accompany them on their next day trip in March. It not only gives me a great opportunity to connect with international students, it also gives me an excuse to visit an historical site outside of St. Andrews.

My research cohort is an interesting group of people from all over the world. Although the majority of us are from the United States, we have people from China, Ethiopia, Australia, Ireland, and of course the UK. Some are fellow missionaries. One woman was working in India prior to coming to Scotland. Another was working with CRU on U.S. college campuses in the Midwest. Others are pastors, one of whom is pastoring an evangelical church in Puerto Rico. There are two pastors from Australia, one of whom is an Anglican priest.

Although we come from a variety of traditions and backgrounds, we work well together because we share a common goal. The goal is to seek the truth and to seek it in such a way that it will serve the church. We may not agree on every point, but we all agree that "there is some theological truth of the matter and that this truth of the matter can be ascertained and understood by human beings (theologians included!)" ~ Oliver Crisp. The Truth that we are seeking is not an abstract concept, but the Person of Jesus Christ, the One whom John refers to as the Logos.
